

Conference Report: "On Track V - Different youth work approaches for different NEET situations"

7th -11th of December 2021 Istanbul



Background

The current times are challenging for most of us, but especially are challenging for those that are not on track. 17.6% of the 20-34 year-olds in the EU in 2020 were neither in employment nor in education and training (NEETs)¹. They have somehow disappeared from the system e.g. school push-out², unemployed that are thrown from the dole, homeless youngsters, who don't find their way to services or help, people living in illegal situations, people alienated from society. Young people in NEET situations constitute an increasing and remarkable group and have become one of the key challenges for European states to tackle for the last decade, particularly as a result of the social and economic developments in the globe.

Conference "On Track" is part of the SALTO Inclusion & Diversity Resource Centre, as well as the Turkish Erasmus+ NA, a longer-term strategic approach to reach young people who are excluded from the system and see how we can reconnect them to society and improve their opportunities in life.

Conference: "On Track 5 - Different youth work approaches for different NEET situations" (www.salto-youth.net/ontrackconference5/) was designed and organized as a follow up activity of the previous fourth editions On Track conferences organized by SALTO Inclusion and Diversity and Turkish National Agency.

The conference has been dedicated to support collaboration and exchange between professionals from different sectors in order to create better opportunities for young people in a NEET situation and enable their active involvement in society and integration into the labor market. It had the following **objectives**:

- To explore different NEET realities, as well as different types of practices, resources and tools.
- To exchange the variety of ways of working with young people in a NEET situation.
- To look into the existing and future trends & challenges and how those impact youth work with young people in a NEET situation.
- To provide opportunities for cooperation and networking to use the possibilities of Erasmus+ and European Solidarity Corps for young people in NEET situations.

The fifth edition, residential and online at the same time

Priori to the residential meeting in December 2021, the participants were invited to an 1h30 online meeting on 25th of November. **The online meeting** had the aim to prepare the participants for the conference, to provide all the safety regulations regarding Covid management and to start the process of getting to know each other.

The team will also offer an **online follow-up meeting**, in 2022. That meeting will have the aim to reconnect and to follow-up some of the concrete partnership ideas that were developed during the 2021 conference.

Participants

The conference brought together a total number of 62 professionals from different sectors dealing with NEET situations from 23 Countries: Albania, Azerbaijan, Belgium, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Czech Republic, Estonia, Finland, Georgia, Iceland, Italy, Latvia, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Portugal, Romania, Serbia, Spain, Sweden, Slovenia, Turkey, Ukraine, Uzbekistan and Tajikistan.

Next to the participants, the conference gathered input from **7 experts** from **4 different** countries, Belgium, Turkey, UK and Guatemala. We heard the voices of **5** young people from **4** different countries. The entire event was coordinated by a team of **7 people** from **4** different countries. In total there were **81 people** involved from all over the world.

Methodology

The core methodology was based on bringing various sectors together dealing with NEET issues in various contexts giving the opportunity to share realities, different approaches and good practices, allowing sufficient space for young people who had gone through a NEET situation in particular, in order to foster synergy and cooperation amongst various actors. All presentations and a summary of all the information shared is available on padlet: https://jintvzw.padlet.org/salto/ontrack

In this respect the conference has been constituted on following programme elements:

- **Getting on Track:** Getting to know each other and developing international cooperation ideas
- What NEET track are Europe & Turkey on? Understanding the concept of NEET
 across Europe and beyond. A input session with two quests: lan Goldring from
 Belgium and Nazlı Aktakke from Turkey
- Where did the train come from? Sharing local NEET reality. Participants shared the realities of the NEET situation in their local area / country.
- Who is on the track? Participants heard the lived reality of young people who have been in NEET situations. We had 5 courageous young people who are or were in a NEET situation and shared their story with the group: Joe Specker, The Netherlands, Beatriz Monteiro, Portugal, Ümit Yardim, Turkey, Abdurrahman Parlar, Turkey and Julio Elvisey, Romania.
- At which station we are now? new normal Reflections on the impact of COVID19 on youth and youth work on the basis of NEET issues with Özgehan Şenyuva
- What is on the routh in front of us? Discussing future trends, changes, challenges
 and opportunities regarding young people in a NEET situation and youth work.
 Discussing the resilience of young people, youth sector and other stakeholders
 regarding crisis and trends with Dr. Oğuz Demir and John Loughton
- What routes can we take? sharing good practice experience from the participants.
 We had seven practices presented. From Turkey, we had Erhan Arslan from Turkonfed that open the session and then 6 good practices were introduced by the participants:


- With whom we travel onwards? This was the space offered to the participants to start reflecting on common ideas that they could develop together

- With whom we travel onwards? offering the space to further work on the common future ideas and provide wider networking opportunity
- What vehicles can we use? Opening the space to share resources for working with young people in NEET situations: such as Erasmus Plus, European Solidarity Corps programmes, different tools that can be transferred to different realities.
- Looking back at our journey reflecting on the overall conference and assessing the outcomes from different sides i.e. individual, organizational, professional etc.



Evaluation by the participants




On the question about general satisfaction 43% of participants gave the maximum mark 10 out of 10 and 34% second highest mark 9 out of 10, leaving the remaining 23% participant with marks 7 and 8.




Participants assessed that objectives of the conference are met between 83% and 90%, namely:

- To explore different NEET realities, as well as different types of practices, resources and tool 89%:
- To exchange the variety of ways of working with young people in a NEET situation 83%;
- To look into the existing and future trends & challenges and how those impact youth work with young people in a NEET situation 84%
- To provide opportunities for cooperation and networking to use the possibilities of Erasmus+ and European Solidarity Corps for young people in NEET situations 90%. **Average reach of objectives is 86.73%**.




There is significant improvement in participants' understanding of the concept of NEET, and different NEET relities with 100% of participants having improvement of at least 1 level and everyone except one participant after the conference have "good" or "excellent" understanding.



There is significant improvement in participants' understanding of different methods, tools and resources of working with young people in NEET situations, or at risk of


being in a NEET situation with 100% of participants having improvement of at least 1 level. Majority of participants after the conference have "good" or "excellent" understanding.



76% participants feel "good" or "excellent" confident to work cross-sectorally, or in cross-sector projects on the topic of NEET. Fact that the program and profile of participants of the conference was very diverse including different stakeholders definitely contributed to this.



All participants gained more confidence to work internationally or on international projects on the topic of NEET.



Huge majority of participants are "more than satisfied" or "very satisfied" with all elements of the conference. One of participants marked "not at all satisfied" with the venue - because is was not in the city center, but not because of the quality of the venue.

Any specific comments regarding programmes, methodology, speakers, trainers, materials, venue, preparation etc.

The participants appreciated the methods used at the conference, the speakers and the facilitation of the event and the flow of the programme. They would have liked to have speakers that would engage them more but at the same time they valued their expertise. For some participants the conference gave the opportunity to understand new, better tools and how to transform it into projects as well. Some participants appreciated the energisers, some considered it for younger participants. Participants that were beginners, would have appreciated more information, better introduction of the speakers.

Participants would appreciate more time to talk about good practices and more time to develop new ideas or projects.

The trainer's approach was appreciated, although there were moments when it was a bit too informal. Nevertheless, they appreciated their motivation and passion for their working field. Also the methodology proposed was considered appropriate and well used. "Everything was well-planned, well-thought and organized beforehand. I liked day one, it gave us a chance to meet each other. Trainers are really communicative, thoughtful and professionals". The program was for some of the participants too packed, they would have appreciated less hours of schedule, maybe with less refreshments.

The venue was considered great but far away from the city. The food and the other facilities were also appreciated. The environment was considered absolutely beautiful. Minor problems in technological materials could be fixed.

At the same time the conference was very powerful and inspiring. It gave them some new energy for their work.

What aspect of this conference did you value the most?

The participants appreciated most of the sessions, few sessions were highlighted by participants, like the contact making session, the networking opportunities, the testimonies of young people in a neet-situation, the exchange of tools and methods, the input on 'the new normal' and 'future perspectives'. "Speakers who were in the NEET situation for a while in their life later became successful... Their stories affected me a lot. It was so special to be invited to this Conference."

It was appreciated that the participants had the chance to work together and to share different realities. The guests' inputs were highly appreciated. Most of them were mentioned among all, the input of Ozgehan Senyuva was mostly mentioned and appreciated, because he managed to change different perspectives positively and he opened a new perspective for the participants.

It also mentioned the different practices, SALTO, European Solidarity Corps and Erasmus+information! It would have been better if there was more time for that. The good practices session, as well as the tools which were represented by Swedish participants, were appreciated as well.

The group appreciated the non-formal exchanges, working in small groups, opportunities to give and receive feedback on our previous work and to share and absorb different realities and to create partnerships for future programs.

What aspects of this conference could be improved?

Some participants said that the programme was too packed. They would have appreciated 6 hours per day of work, not 8. After input from speakers it would be nice to have some time in small groups to reflect. Different methodologies can be implemented to improve the collaboration opportunities. The impact analysis or the change measurements after the best practices can be discussed. The group would have liked more sessions in smaller task-specific and more time to discuss in smaller groups. Some would have liked a bit more time for networking and the sessions at the end (the open discussions) were a bit short. Some of the participants were asked to prepare a workshop and they spent time and effort on it, so if possible, dont cut them off next time. Also it would've been great if the practices in different countries were filmed, so the group could see all of them later, because out of 6 workshops, the participants could only see2.

Few participants asked for more good examples from real life and for more clear instructions of dealing with the NEET situation, more concrete tools as mentioned and more real stories, from youth work experience. The surprise show was too much for some of the participants.

Hotel nearby the city would be comfortable, because it would be possible to walk around in the evening and it was so big so it is not good to relax and talk to the other people and also not to feel safe because of the services provided by the hotel. Regarding the preparation of the event, the email communication could have been improved "it was nice to have had the information about the venue earlier as this caused a bit of stress, but on the other side it made me leave my comfort zone, you always control nothing".

Conclusion

The fifth edition of the On Track conference was a success, despite the hard times of the pandemic. The objectives of the conference were achieved and the participants considered that the program and the methodology proposed was relevant. Once again it was a plus to have a diversity of inputs, from experts with a different background and from different contexts. A highlight of the program remains the session when the young people share stories from their own reality and how they overcome a NEET situation. To create a good dynamic in the group, it is important to have a large diversity of participants, coming from different fields of actions and even different countries. It also highlighted the impact of hearing realities outside Europe. This is a feature that should remain in future editions. The topic of NEET needs to be continuously discussed, because the effect of the current pandemic are not yet seen, and once again this will impact the most the ones who are already in less privileged conditions.
