Make Democracy Great Again




About the Project









There are multiple factors that have fostered the growth of populist movements some of which are stagnating incomes as a negative consequence of globalization, reactions against progressive cultural values such as internationalism, LGBTQ+ rights and feminism and the impact of some global shocks e.g. the refugee crisis. In the face of such dramatic changes in society and the economy, people become more responsive to populist politicians and movements that raise issues, which major parties have either downplayed or overlooked, and that offer simple "quick fix" solutions.

However, to achieve their political aspirations and gain popularity, populist leaders often (but not always) use divisive narratives such as:

- · anti-establishment, including distrust of mainstream parties and experts
- · anti-globalization, including Euroscepticism and narrow nationalism
- · xenophobia and Islamophobia
- · cultural conservatism and misogyny

What is more, populists focus on the conflict between" the people" and" the elite" or" the establishment", all of which are vague terms and can be interpreted differently. They also use rhetoric that stirs up anger among citizens and directs that anger to" straw men".

In order to respond to these changes in society, the Danish-Romanian Association held a training course called "Make Democracy Great Again" aimed at increasing youth workers' competences upon supporting young people in their political identity formation and helping them understand the characteristics of populism and its tools. The training course was held between 4th till 13th of September 2019 in Vadul lui Voda, Moldova and was funded by the Erasmus+ programme of the European Union.

As a part of the programme of the course, the participants created their own nonformal education methods aimed at enhancing young people's critical thinking and encouraging them to reflect on their own political identity. The finished methods are presented in the following pages with instructions on how to facilitate them and how to encourage young people to reflect on the learning that takes place.

The methods are suitable for large groups with 15+ participants and the average duration is between 30 to 50 minutes.



FRUIT SALAD UNION

TIME: 40 min

LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

- identifying elements of populistic rhetoric
- reflecting on populistic tools and how they are used to influence opinions

Instructions:

Present to the participants the following situation – they are all living in the fictional country of Green Banana. The country is faced with the very important decision of wether it should stay or leave the Fruit Salad Union. There are two parties represting the leave and remain sides - Orange party and Strawberry party, respectively. Choose 6 participants to form the parties – 3 members in each. The rest of the participants are citizens of Green Banana.


The two parties have to prepare a speech argumenting why Green Banana should leave or remain in the FSU. They will have 15 min to prepare their speeches, which should be no longer than 2 minutes each. After the parties present their speeches, the citiznes have 5 minutes to vote on the referendum.

Once you have counted the votes and announced the vote of the majority, you can go into debriefing.

Debrief Questions:

- 1. Which party was more convincing in its arguments and why?
- 2. What kind of key words and ideas did each party use to make their speeches compelling?
- 3. Was it difficult to choose a side? Why/ Why not?
- 4. Is a referendum a good way to resolve the given issue? Why/ Why not?

SPOT THE DIFFERENCES



LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

- recognising common features of populistic rhetoric
- discerning populist and non-populist communication
- devoloping critical thinking

Instructions:

Divide the participants in groups of 4-5. Each group will be given 2 papers, both containing pieces of a political programme/statements/speeches. The quotes on the first paper will be from populist politicians, and heavily populistic in their rhetoric. The quotes on the second will be less populistic, traditional political communication. You can find example quotes attached, but feel free to adjust them or come up with your own.

Explain which paper belongs to populists and which do not. The goal of the groups will be the following:

- 1) find common elements in the quotes on each paper
- 2) find differences between the quotes on the two papers
 Make sure that they concentrate on the rhetoric utilised in the statements, and
 not just on their content. Give them around 15 minutes to read and discuss in
 their group the statements.

Afterwards, reunite the groups, and let someone from each group explain what they have found, and whether they agree or disagree with the others. Finish with debrief questions, reflecting on what they have learnt.

Debrief Questions:

- 1. Was it easy to find similarities and differences?
- 2. Did you agree with the placement of each statement? Was there any that did not belong?
- 3. Which key words and concepts are used by populists?
- 4. Which one is more convincing?





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WHO IS THE POPULIST?

TIME: 60 min

LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

- to help young people recognise populism and its characteristics
- to encourage young people to reflect the differences between populist and other political parties

Instructions:

Introduce participants to the setting of the exercise. The action takes place in the small town of Happyville, on the annual traditional local festival which is a marvelous and colourful display of culture and customs for both residents and guests of Happyville. Representatives from two parties are attending the festival to make an opening speech and to address all attendees.

Choose people who will present the two parties – Cheer Nation and JoyForAll (about 2-3 people in each). Both parties should create a speech about 1:30-2 min. Each party wants to push forth their political agenda and get as many supporters as they can. They have about 15 minutes to prepare their speech. Every group will get a list of key words and instructions. One party is populist and the other is right wing. Do not reveal this information to the rest of the participants but only to the people in the parties.

In addition, choose 2 people to represent an immigrant minority and two traditionalist who are against foreigners. While the parties are preparing their speech, these people are trying to speak to the citizens about their convictions and beliefs. The rest of the participants are the citizens of Happyville and they should listen attentively to both speeches. After the speeches, tell the participants that the two parties represent two different political ideologies – populism and nationalism. After that you can go into debrief.

Debriefing:

- · What are the differences between the two speeches you just heard?
- · Were there any similarities between the two?
- · Were you able to recognize which party is which?
- · How can you recognize who is who? What are the features of each direction (nationalism and populism)?
- · Were there any key words that helped you recognize the populist party?

Tip for facilitators:

- · Consider the people you choose to develop and deliver the speeches. They should be able to understand the role and feel comfortable with speaking in front of an audience.
- · It is important that the participants in the political parties do not reveal their political identity before the end of the exercise so you might want to separate them further away from the citizens.

THEATRE OF THE OPPRESSED

TIME: 30-50 min

LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

- Understanding how populism works and what it appeals to
- Understanding how populism can influence middle classes
- Reflecting on active citizenship and how one can take action against populism

Instructions:

A few participants will take part in a short theatre performance, where there will be a clearly defined oppressor and an oppressed, plus another couple of actors. The play will be split into 2 scenes – the first scene takes place in the oppressor's home where he complains about an increase in the cost of living and shows some interest in the "People's Party", a populist party particularly against migrants. Here you can show a video of a populist leader speaking as if it is played on TV. The second scene takes place in a pub where the oppressor adopts an antagonistic attitude towards the oppressed and a friend of the latter who eventually decide to leave the pub.

After the play, the game rules are explained and the actors will play over and over again. Each time, max. 1 person from the audience will have the chance to freeze the scene and take the place of one of the actors but the oppressor and the oppressed. Not more than one interruption is allowed per play. This way the audience will play an active role in determining the outcome of the performance and shaping the fate of some of the actors.

Debrief Questions:

- 1. Why, among all actors, did you choose to impersonate those actors rather than others?
- 2. Why have not you decided not to act the part of certain actors, and, if you had, then what do they envisage the outcome of the play being?
- 3. Have you or any of your friends come across people of the sort in your everyday life? If so, how did you/they react or would have liked to react?

EXTINCTION VOTE

TIME: 30-50 min

LEARNING OBJECTIVES:



- Identifying populist methods of influencing voters
- Distinguishing populist techniques in argumentation
- Promoting self-reflection before decision making/critical thinking

Instructions:

The introduction of the method must present the fictional scenario described below, with importance being applied on the severity of the vote as all species or subjects of debate are near extinction, i.e. even if mosquitoes are chosen as a specie, it must be stressed that they are under threat of extinction in this hypothetical scenario.

At the core of this method lies the simulation of a voting procedure whereby three political parties must present their respective presentations on a certain topic to convince the participants into voting for their narrative. The topic of discussion must involve three examples of subject matters for the parties to advocate for. One must be an object of relatively little importance to be supported by the Populist party; the other two must be of significant importance to the outcome, so as to render voting for the populist party as the objectively wrong choice. An example is the protection of an animal species at the cost of two others. Each political party must present a case in defense of their respective specie of importance. Crucially, the parties' political belonging must not be indicated by their name and it must be left up to the participants to make the judgement on which party is populist. For instance, The Populist Party can be called the White Party; the Liberal Party can be the Orange Party; the Conservative Party can be the Purple Party.

The Conservative party is interested in protecting the specie of Coelacanth Fish and must rely on factual and unemotive arguments in support of the specie's preservation.

The Liberal party is interested in protecting mosquitoes as a specie and must also rely only on factual and unemotive arguments in supporting their case.

The Populist party must advocate for the protection of the Hazel Dormouse. In the process, the party representative must rely on the use of emotive language, makeshift facts and vitally to aggressively dismiss the importance of the narratives purported by opposing parties.

The voting process is to be facilitated through the dispersal of pre-prepared voting sheets mimicking ballot papers containing the names of all parties. After they are individually completed by the participants without external influence, they are to be collected and counted so as to yield the final result of the vote.

Guidance for Reflection of Learning:

It is crucial to describe the importance of the final outcome, regardless of the winning party. Such as, why mosquitoes and Coelacanth fish are important for the environment. Next, elaboration on possible outcomes of the vote must take place, whereby the only wrong vote is that for the populist party supporting the Hazel Dormouse, as it will bring ecological catastrophe in the hypothetical scenario. In the process the participants will be encouraged to discuss their reasons for voting for the respective parties; to observe the factors differentiating the populist party from the conservative and liberal parties; reflecting on the emergency of the voting process as no time for deliberation will be allowed between the final party statement and the voting as this is a tactic facilitating the growth of populist movements and is a frequent tool in their arsenal; commenting on the use of populist methods to varying degrees by all parties as fundamentally all politicians can be said to adopt some level of populist narrative.

Debrief Questions:

- 1. Why did you vote for the specie you chose to save?
- 2. Do you consider the other two species important for the environment?
- 3. How did each speaker choose to present their case? Did you find any differences or similarities?
- 4. Who was the most convincing speaker and why?
- 5. Were you able to recognize which party is populistic?
- 6. What are the characteristics of a populist party?



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MATERIALS AND RESOURCES

FRUIT SALAD UNION: Key Cards

Orange Party – You should convince the citizens that being a member of FSU is a burden for Green Banana. Consider that there is a great amount of immigrants in your country and their presence threatens to change the dynamic and the composition of society and their culture will affect your own irreversibly. Moreover, you see being a member of FSU as an intervention into the internal affairs of Green Banana.

Strawberry Party - You should convince the people to vote for staying in the FSU. Emphasize the fact that you are an activist for human rights and strongly disagree with the anti-immigrant attitude of your main opponent- Orange Party. Highlight the significant role of FSU for the country's economic growth and prosperity that has been achieved through investments and funding.

SPOT THE DIFFERENCES

Populist statements (example)

All power to the people! As we move forward in these trying times, we must understand that the power will always and forever remain with the people. To the millions of women around the world who marched to bring awareness to the many injustices facing humanity today; the power remains with you. To the thousands of veterans who spent many cold nights defending the native lands of an objectified people; the power remains with you. To the masses who protested against the brutal murders of citizens by law enforcement; the power remains with you. To the students who spent countless hours in study bringing attention to issues that affect our future generations; the power remains with you.

I will give choice to the People. Because in the democracy only the people can be right against them... The establishment protected itself, but not the citizens.

People want to take back control of their countries and they want to take back control of their lives and the lives of their family.

Victory is not exactly that I was elected as a Prime Minister of Sleepyville. The victory is that you have decided.

Non-populist statements (example)

It is our position that special education teachers can currently expect a downright humiliating pay check, so the government must adjust their salaries.

We know that every child, no matter who they are, how much their families earn, or where they live, should have access to a high-quality education, from preschool through high school and beyond

We believe that climate change poses a real and urgent threat to our economy, our national security, and our children's health and futures, and that the citizens of Sleepyville deserve the jobs and security that come from becoming the clean energy superpower of the 21st century.

At the heart of our policy objectives are three closely interlinked areas of focus: the quality of participatory and representative democracy, social justice, and the protection of the environment and ecological sustainability.

The gratitude of every home in our Island, in our Empire, and indeed throughout the world, except in the abodes of the guilty, goes out to the airmen of Sleepyville who, undaunted by odds, unwearied in their constant challenge and mortal danger, are turning the tide of the World War by their prowess and by their devotion. Never in the field of human conflict was so much owed by so many to so few.

WHO IS THE POPULIST?

Key Cards

Populist party:

You represent the populist party, you should prepare a speech against the corrupted "elite" that controls Happyville and has diverged funding from the public sector – such as schools, hospitals and even the current festival – to building new luxurious apartment buildings and expensive shopping centres.

Your key words: #elite #us versus them #fake news #economic development and prosperity for all; #people first.

Nationalist party:

You are the nationalist party. Your speech will focus on ani-internationalization and the negative sides of immigrant influx, the threat they seemingly "pose" to national security and the changes that they bring in the local society and culture.

Your key words: #nation #immigrants #national identity #national security and safety; #our country first; #less crime; #defend what is ours; # Old Glory.

EXTINCTION VOTE

Speeches:

Orange Party (saving mosquitoes)

Ladies and Gentlemen,

The choice we are about to make is crucial, but I am convinced that eventually the decision made will be guided by reason and dignity, even though my choice of species seems to be infamous for its putative crimes.

But let us take a moment and think about mosquitoes!
