


In so many different ways






The use of emoticons have become that crucial that sometimes they led to misunderstandings...

As with other communication aspects such as body language, the interpretation of emojis also changes among cultures.








But modern communication is not only about emojis




Important aspect to consider



Who decides about emojis?

The **Unicode** Standard is the universal character-encoding standard **used** for representation of text for computer processing.

Unicode is a worldwide characterencoding standard, published by the Unicode Consortium. Computers store numbers that represent a character; Unicode provides a unique number for every character.

Sleepy Face

A yellow face with closed eyes, mouth slightly open, and a blue snot bubble coming from its nose. Snot bubbles indicate a character is tired or sleeping in anime or manga. Not to be confused with Sleeping Face

While sometimes used to convey sadness, dissastification, or illness, Sleepy Face is also not to be confused with ② Crying Face, ② Sad but Relieved Face, or other emojis with tear or sweat droplets. Samsung's design previously featured two, cartoon-styled, sleeping-symbol Zz's overhead.

Sleepy Face was approved as part of Unicode 6.0 in 2010 and added to Emoji 1.0 in 2015.

6 OK Hand

A gesture showing the index finger and thumb touching to make an open circle. Represents "I'm okay" or "yes, that's correct / good".

In American Sign Language (ASL), the number nine is represented with this gesture. The same hand sign can be seen as offensive in some cultures, including in parts of Europe, the Middle East, and South America.

Attempts have been made to imply that this is a symbol of "White Power", which may be the case depending on context.

OK Hand was approved as part of Unicode 6.0 in 2010 under the name "OK Hand and added to Emoji 1.0 in 2015.

How to submit a new emoji proposal

1. The <name(s)> must clearly identify each emoji being proposed Proposed emoji names should be general. Adjectives or other narrowing terminology should be avoided except where necessary to distinguish from an existing character. For example, instead of SWAN FACE, the name should be SWAN. Some existing emoji names deviate from this for historical reasons
