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Objectives of #MIND

Promote Intercultural Learning and Dialogue: To facilitate meaningful interactions among young people from various cultural and ethnic backgrounds, encouraging them to share experiences, understand different perspectives, and learn from each other in a respectful environment. **Encourage Youth Participation in Public Life:** To motivate young individuals to actively engage in public life, using their intercultural learning experiences as a foundation for contributing positively to society and advocating for inclusive policies and practices.

Equip Young People with Intercultural Competencies: To provide participants with essential knowledge and skills that help prevent conflict and youth radicalization, thereby contributing to peaceful coexistence and mutual understanding among diverse groups. **Foster Tolerance, Acceptance, and Respect:** To encourage participants to embrace and respect people from cultures different from their own, understanding the value of diversity and the importance of inclusive communities.

Develop Youth-Led Initiatives: To support the creation and implementation of initiatives led by young people that promote intercultural dialogue and discourage radicalization, aiming to make a tangible impact in their local and broader communities.



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Purpose of the Toolkit

The MIND Toolkit is designed to equip youth workers and organizations with a comprehensive set of resources aimed at promoting intercultural understanding and addressing discrimination. This toolkit serves as a practical guide for facilitating dialogue, understanding, and action among young people from diverse backgrounds. It provides innovative methods and activities rooted in non-formal education principles, enabling facilitators to engage youth in meaningful conversations and experiences that foster respect, empathy, and inclusivity.



What is cultural and intercultural communication?

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Background

Inspired by the #MIND project, this toolkit encapsulates the rich experiences and insights gained from implementing a wide range of intercultural and anti-discrimination activities. The #MIND project highlighted the transformative power of non-formal education in bridging cultural divides and combating stereotypes and prejudices. It brought together young individuals from various cultural backgrounds, facilitating a journey of mutual discovery, understanding, and empowerment. This toolkit aims to share the successful strategies and lessons learned from the #MIND project, providing a roadmap for others to follow in fostering a more inclusive and tolerant society.

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Core Principles

- **Respect for Diversity:** Understanding and valuing the rich tapestry of human cultures is fundamental. This principle is about celebrating differences and recognizing the strength that diversity brings to our communities.
- **Inclusivity:** Ensuring that everyone, regardless of their background, has the opportunity to participate fully. This means actively removing barriers to participation and creating environments where all feel welcome and valued.
- **Active Participation:** Engaging young people not just as beneficiaries but as active contributors to the learning process. This involves facilitating opportunities for them to share their perspectives, co-create knowledge, and take action on issues that matter to them.

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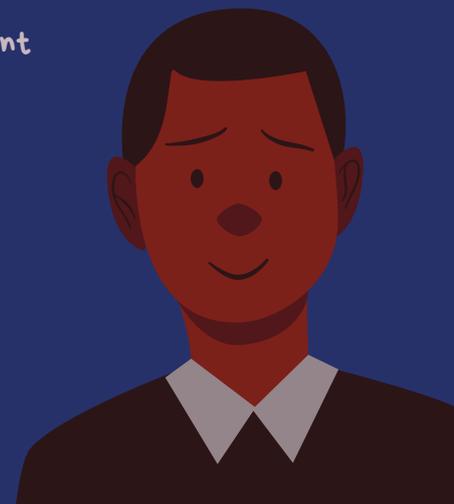
Core Principles

- **Empathy and Understanding:** Encouraging participants to put themselves in others' shoes, fostering a deep sense of empathy and understanding. This is about more than just tolerating differences; it's about building genuine connections and empathy across cultural divides.
- **Critical Thinking and Reflection:** Promoting the ability to critically analyze information, challenge stereotypes, and reflect on one's own beliefs and assumptions. This critical stance is crucial for understanding complex intercultural dynamics and combating discrimination.
- **Commitment to Action:** Inspiring participants to take what they've learned and apply it in their communities. This involves supporting them in developing initiatives that promote intercultural dialogue and challenge discriminatory practices.

Toolkit Components

The MIND Toolkit is structured to offer a wide range of activities, methods, and resources, all aimed at empowering youth workers and organizations to foster intercultural understanding and combat discrimination. Each component is designed to be adaptable, allowing facilitators to tailor activities to meet the unique needs and contexts of their participants.



Communication as an interaction

Communication binds people together. Their interaction with one another connects their understanding.



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Two Truths and a Lie Activity

"Two Truths and a Lie" is a simple yet engaging icebreaker activity that fosters interaction and helps participants get to know each other in a fun and informal way. It encourages sharing personal information indirectly, which can lead to surprising discoveries about one another and stimulate conversations. This activity is particularly effective in new groups where participants are not familiar with each other.

How It Works:

1. Preparation: No special materials are required, making this activity easy to implement in any setting, whether in-person or virtual.

2. Instructions to Participants:

- Each participant is asked to think of three statements about themselves: two truths and one lie. The lie should be plausible enough to make it challenging for others to guess.
- Participants take turns sharing their three statements with the group, without revealing which statement is the lie.

3. Guessing Phase:

- After a participant shares their statements, the rest of the group tries to guess which one is the lie. They can ask questions to probe further into the details of each statement, but the participant sharing should not disclose any additional information that would make the guessing obvious.
- The group can work together or individually to decide on their guess.

4. Reveal and Discussion:

- Once guesses have been made, the participant reveals which statement was the lie.
- They then briefly elaborate on the truths, providing a little background or story behind them. This often leads to follow-up questions and discussions, deepening connections among the group.

5. Repeat: The process repeats until all participants have had a turn.



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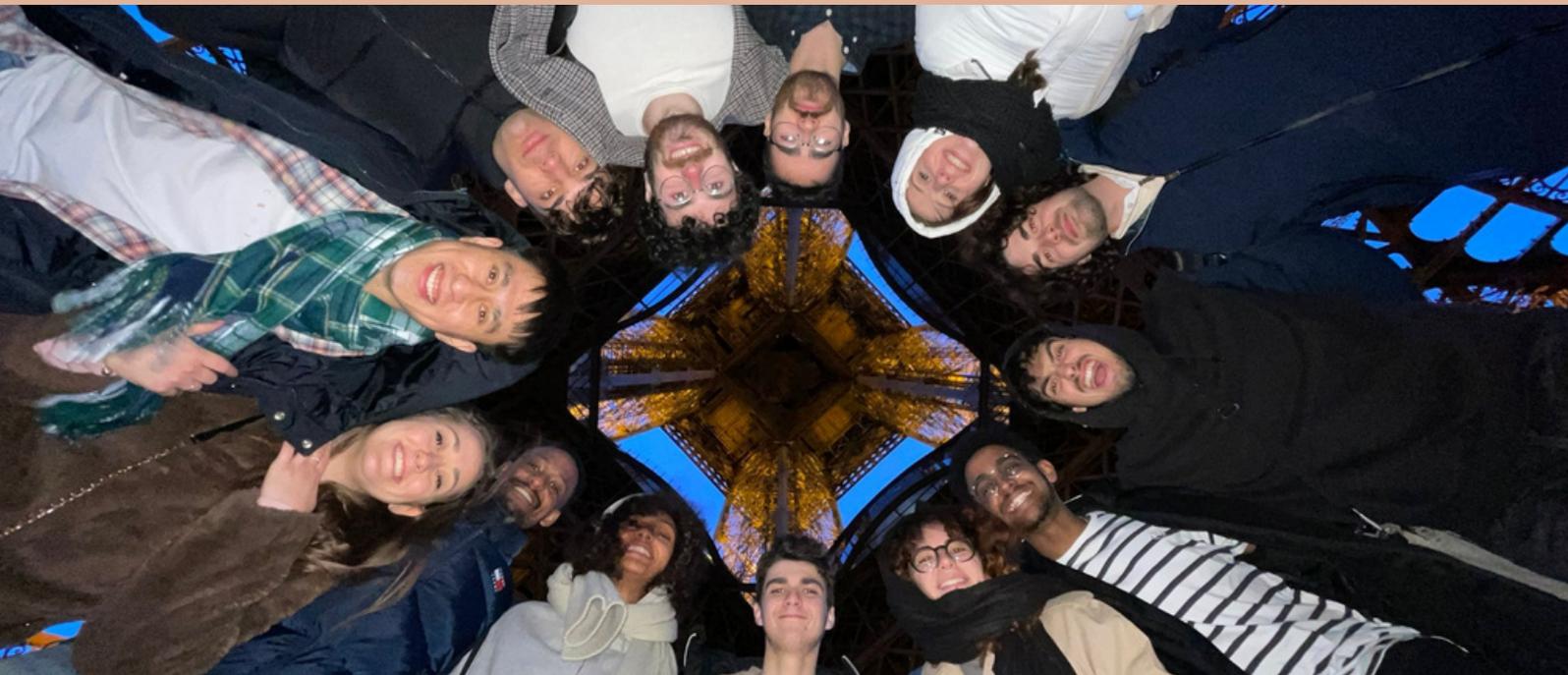
Two Truths and a Lie Activity

Objectives and Benefits:

- **Engagement:** This activity breaks the ice in a new group, creating a relaxed atmosphere conducive to interaction.
- **Learning about Each Other:** It provides insights into participants' lives, interests, and experiences, which might not emerge in ordinary conversations.
- **Critical Thinking:** Participants engage in questioning and critical thinking as they try to discern truths from the lie.
- **Fun:** The game introduces humor and light-heartedness, making it an enjoyable way to start any group session or workshop.

Tips for Facilitators:

- Encourage creativity and humor in the statements to enhance the fun.
- Ensure a respectful and non-judgmental environment, where participants feel comfortable sharing.
- Debrief the activity by reflecting on the experience and what participants learned about each other, highlighting the importance of assumptions and perceptions.

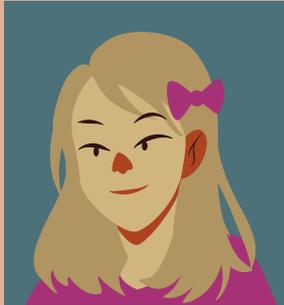


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Communication as a social context

The activity of producing, transmitting and receiving meaningful symbolic messages in an environment such as schools, church or any social gathering is communication.



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The Cultural Workshop

The Cultural Workshop activity is designed to celebrate diversity and foster intercultural understanding among participants through the exploration of various cultural topics. This activity allows individuals to delve into aspects of their own culture or another culture they are interested in, such as food, music, dance, or art, and share their findings with the group. The aim is to broaden participants' perspectives on different cultures, encouraging appreciation, empathy, and respect for diversity.

How It Works:

1. Preparation:

- Participants are given time to choose a cultural topic they are passionate about or curious to explore. This can be an aspect of their own culture or another culture they wish to learn more about.
- They are asked to prepare a short presentation on their chosen topic.

2. Presentation:

- Participants share their findings with the group through a short presentation. To foster creativity and engagement, they are encouraged to use various methods such as role-plays, games, storytelling, or even multimedia presentations.

3. Engagement Techniques:

- **Storytelling:** Personal stories or traditional tales related to the topic can captivate the audience, making the cultural aspect being discussed more relatable and memorable.

4. Interactive Discussion:

- Following each presentation, the floor is opened for questions and discussions. This allows participants to delve deeper into each topic, fostering curiosity and understanding.
- The presenter can facilitate a mini-activity related to their presentation to involve the audience actively, further enhancing the learning experience.



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The Cultural Workshop

Objectives and Benefits:

- **Cultural Appreciation:** This activity highlights the richness of different cultures, encouraging participants to celebrate diversity and recognize the value of cultural exchange.
- **Active Learning:** By researching and preparing presentations, participants actively engage in learning about cultural topics, which enhances retention and understanding.
- **Creative Expression:** Encouraging the use of creative methods for presentations allows participants to express themselves and their cultural identities in unique ways.
- **Community Building:** Sharing and discussing cultural topics fosters a sense of community and mutual respect among participants, breaking down barriers and building connections.

Tips for Facilitators:

- Provide resources or suggest platforms where participants can find reliable information for their research.
- Set clear guidelines for presentation length and format to ensure that everyone has an equal opportunity to share.
- Encourage respect and open-mindedness during discussions to maintain a positive and inclusive environment.



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MIND Your YouthPass & Erasmus+

The "MIND Your YouthPass & Erasmus+" activity is designed to inform and engage participants about the value of non-formal learning experiences and the recognition of skills acquired through such programs, specifically within the context of the Erasmus+ program and the YouthPass certificate. This activity is crucial for participants to appreciate the personal and professional growth opportunities offered by Erasmus+ projects and understand how to articulate and leverage these experiences in their future endeavors.

How It Works:

1. Introduction to YouthPass:

- Facilitators provide an overview of the YouthPass certificate, explaining its purpose as a tool for recognizing the skills and competences acquired through non-formal and informal learning activities within the Erasmus+ program.
- Discussion on the eight key competences outlined by YouthPass, and how these competences can be developed through Erasmus+ activities.

2. Reflecting on Learning Outcomes:

- Participants are encouraged to reflect on their learning experiences during the project, identifying specific skills and competences they have developed or enhanced.
- Facilitators guide participants in articulating these skills in the context of the YouthPass competences, helping them to recognize the value of their non-formal learning experiences.

3. Exploring Erasmus+ Opportunities:

- A presentation on the Erasmus+ program, highlighting its objectives, the variety of projects and mobility opportunities available (such as youth exchanges, volunteer services, and training and networking events), and how young people can get involved.
- Sharing success stories or testimonials from individuals who have benefited from Erasmus+ projects, showcasing the potential impact on personal growth, employability, and social inclusion.

4. Practical Guidance:

- Providing practical advice on how to apply for Erasmus+ projects, including tips on finding project partners, writing project proposals, and navigating the application process.
- Discussing how to effectively use the YouthPass certificate in resumes, job applications, and interviews to communicate the non-formal education experiences and competences acquired.

Objectives and Benefits:

- **Awareness:** Increases participants' awareness of the recognition of non-formal learning through YouthPass and the plethora of opportunities offered by the Erasmus+ program.
- **Skill Identification:** Helps participants identify and articulate the skills and competences they have developed, enhancing their self-awareness and personal development.
- **Empowerment:** Empowers participants to take initiative in their learning and career paths by engaging in Erasmus+ opportunities and effectively using their YouthPass in their professional lives.
- **Networking:** Encourages participants to explore and engage with the broader Erasmus+ community, potentially opening up new opportunities for learning and collaboration.

Tips for Facilitators:

- Ensure the presentation is interactive and engaging, perhaps by integrating multimedia elements or inviting guest speakers with Erasmus+ experience.
- Facilitate group discussions or workshops where participants can work on drafting their YouthPass reflections or project ideas for Erasmus+ applications.
- Provide resources or direct participants to where they can find more information about YouthPass and Erasmus+ opportunities after the project concludes.

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MIND the radicalisation, hate and fake news

The workshop is a critical educational session designed to delve into the complex and urgent issues of radicalization, hate speech, and the dissemination of fake news. By providing participants with a comprehensive understanding of these phenomena, the workshop aims to foster a responsible and proactive stance against these societal challenges. Here's a breakdown of how the workshop is structured and its objectives:

How It Works:

1. Introduction to Key Concepts:

- The session begins with an introduction to the definitions of radicalization, hate speech, and fake news, establishing a common understanding among participants.
- Facilitators highlight the significance of recognizing these phenomena and their implications on individual and social levels.

2. Case Studies and Real-World Examples:

- Facilitators present a variety of case studies and real-world examples that illustrate instances of radicalization, hate speech, and fake news across different contexts and media platforms.
- These examples serve as a basis for discussion, encouraging participants to critically analyze the root causes, mechanisms, and effects of these phenomena.

3. Group Analysis and Discussion:

- Participants are divided into small groups to facilitate in-depth discussions on the presented case studies. This setup encourages active participation and enables a diverse exchange of perspectives.
- Groups are tasked with identifying the factors contributing to the spread of radicalization, hate speech, and fake news, as well as discussing the societal impact of these issues.

4. Impact on Social Cohesion and Democratic Values:

- The workshop addresses how radicalization, hate speech, and fake news undermine social cohesion, democratic values, and the fabric of peaceful coexistence.
- Participants are encouraged to reflect on the consequences of these phenomena on trust, dialogue, and tolerance within society.

5. Empowerment and Counter-Strategies:

- The session shifts focus towards empowerment, discussing strategies and actions individuals and communities can adopt to counter hate speech and the spread of fake news.
- Facilitators introduce the concept of alternative narratives that promote diversity, tolerance, and peaceful coexistence, encouraging participants to brainstorm and propose ideas.

6. Role as Active Citizens:

- Participants reflect on their potential role as active citizens in preventing radicalization and combating hate speech and fake news.
- The workshop concludes with a call to action, motivating participants to engage in civic activities that foster a more inclusive and informed society.

Objectives and Benefits:

- **Awareness:** Increases participants' awareness of the complexities surrounding radicalization, hate speech, and fake news.
- **Critical Thinking:** Enhances critical thinking and analytical skills, enabling participants to discern reliable information and understand the underlying motives of hate-driven narratives.
- **Empowerment:** Empowers participants with the knowledge and tools to actively counteract and challenge harmful narratives and practices.
- **Active Citizenship:** Encourages a sense of responsibility and active citizenship, highlighting the importance of individual and collective actions in upholding democratic values and social harmony.

Tips for Facilitators:

- Use diverse and recent examples to ensure relevancy and engagement.
- Foster a safe and respectful environment for open discussion, allowing participants to express their thoughts and questions freely.
- Provide resources for further learning and action, such as fact-checking tools, organizations working against hate speech, and platforms for promoting positive narratives.



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The Creative Expression Workshop

The workshop is a vibrant and engaging activity designed to celebrate diversity and foster intercultural understanding through the universal language of art. This workshop allows participants to delve into their cultural identities and express themselves through various artistic mediums, including painting, sculpture, music, and dance. By sharing these expressions, participants not only gain insights into their own cultural roots but also create bridges of understanding and connection with others from different cultural backgrounds.

How It Works:

1. Introduction to Creative Expression:

- The workshop begins with an introduction to the concept of creative expression and its importance in cultural identity and intercultural dialogue. Facilitators highlight how art transcends language barriers and can convey powerful messages of unity, diversity, and understanding.

2. Exploration of Cultural Roots:

- Participants are encouraged to reflect on their own cultural backgrounds and the aspects they feel most connected to. This could involve traditional art forms, music, dance, or other expressions unique to their culture.

3. Artistic Creation:

- Participants choose their preferred medium of creative expression and begin working on their projects. This hands-on session allows for personal exploration and artistic freedom, with facilitators available to provide support and guidance as needed.
- Workshops could be segmented into different areas for painting, sculpture, music composition, and dance choreography, allowing participants to immerse themselves fully in their chosen art form.

4. Showcase and Sharing:

- Upon completion of their projects, participants are invited to share their work with the group. This showcase is a celebration of diversity and creativity, with each piece serving as a window into the participant's cultural identity and personal experiences.
- During the sharing session, participants explain the inspiration behind their work and the cultural elements it represents. This is an opportunity for storytelling and deeper cultural exchange.

5. Group Reflection:

- The workshop concludes with a group reflection on the process of creative expression and the insights gained from experiencing and learning about the diverse cultural backgrounds represented in the group.
- Participants discuss how creative arts can be used as a tool for promoting intercultural understanding and tolerance.

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MIND Media Literacy

The "MIND Media Literacy" workshop is a crucial educational session designed to empower participants with the skills necessary to navigate the complex landscape of modern media, particularly in the context of extremism and misinformation. This workshop emphasizes the importance of critical thinking, fact-checking, identifying bias, and evaluating the credibility of sources. By equipping participants with these tools, the activity aims to foster a more informed and discerning approach to consuming media content.

How It Works:

1. Introduction to Media Literacy:

- The session begins with an overview of media literacy and its significance in today's information-rich society. Facilitators explain how media can shape perceptions, influence opinions, and sometimes propagate extremism or misinformation.
- Participants are introduced to the concepts of critical thinking and skepticism as essential tools for media consumers.

2. Understanding Media Bias and Source Credibility:

- Participants learn about different types of media bias and the techniques used by media outlets to sway public opinion or evoke emotional responses.
- The workshop covers methods for evaluating the credibility of sources, including checking for author expertise, publication reputation, and cross-referencing information.

3. Fact-Checking Exercises:

- Practical exercises are introduced where participants engage in fact-checking real or simulated media examples. This hands-on approach allows them to apply the concepts learned and understand the challenges of distinguishing fact from fiction.
- Facilitators may use current news articles, social media posts, or other media content related to extremism or controversial topics for these exercises.

4. Evaluating Media Messages:

- Participants work in groups to analyze selected media messages, identifying potential biases, logical fallacies, or misinformation.
- Discussions focus on the impact of these messages on public opinion and social cohesion, emphasizing the role of responsible media consumption in combating extremism.

5. Developing Media Literacy Plans:

- Towards the end of the workshop, participants are encouraged to develop personal or community action plans for promoting media literacy and combating misinformation within their networks.
- These plans could involve educational campaigns, the creation of fact-checking groups, or initiatives to promote critical media consumption among peers.

Objectives and Benefits:

- **Critical Thinking Development:** Enhances participants' ability to critically analyze and question media content, fostering a more discerning and informed approach to information consumption.
- **Awareness of Misinformation:** Raises awareness about the prevalence of misinformation and the tactics used to spread it, particularly in relation to extremist content.
- **Empowerment Against Extremism:** Empowers participants to identify and challenge extremist narratives and misinformation, contributing to a more informed and resilient community.
- **Skills in Fact-Checking and Source Evaluation:** Provides practical skills in fact-checking and evaluating the credibility of sources, valuable in both personal and professional contexts.

Tips for Facilitators:

- Use diverse and relevant examples of media content to ensure the session is engaging and applicable to participants' experiences.
- Encourage open discussion and respect differing viewpoints, fostering an environment where participants feel comfortable sharing their thoughts and analyses.
- Provide resources and tools for fact-checking and further learning, enabling participants to continue developing their media literacy skills beyond the workshop.



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Privilege Walk

The "Privilege Walk" activity is a powerful experiential exercise designed to visually demonstrate the differences in privilege that individuals experience in society. It's an interactive activity that promotes awareness and discussion about the social inequalities and systemic factors that advantage or disadvantage people based on various aspects of their identity, including race, gender, sexual orientation, education, and more.

How It Works:

1. Setup:

- Participants are asked to stand in a straight line side by side in an open space, either indoors or outdoors. This line represents a neutral starting point.
- The facilitator prepares a list of statements related to different aspects of privilege and disadvantage. These statements are designed to reflect various societal privileges or lack thereof (e.g., "If you have never been discriminated against because of your skin color, take one step forward").

2. Execution:

- The facilitator reads each statement aloud. After each statement, participants move forward or backward depending on their own experiences and the privileges or disadvantages the statement addresses.
- It's important that during this activity, the room is silent except for the facilitator's voice, allowing participants to reflect on each statement and their own position in society.

3. Debrief and Discussion:

- After all statements have been read and participants have moved accordingly, a visible spectrum of privilege within the group is displayed based on the participants' positions in the room.
- The facilitator then leads a debriefing session where participants are invited to reflect on their experiences during the activity, how it made them feel, and what they observed.
- This is followed by a guided discussion on the concepts of privilege, systemic oppression, and inequality. Participants discuss the implications of these societal structures and consider ways to address and mitigate their effects.

Objectives and Benefits:

- **Awareness:** Increases participants' awareness of the diverse backgrounds and experiences that exist within a group, highlighting the often unseen privileges or disadvantages that individuals face.
- **Empathy:** Fosters empathy by encouraging participants to consider life experiences different from their own, particularly those of marginalized or disadvantaged groups.



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Privilege Walk

- **Critical Reflection:** Promotes critical reflection on societal structures and personal biases, encouraging participants to think about how they can contribute to more equitable and inclusive environments.
- **Dialogue:** Provides a safe space for open dialogue about difficult topics like discrimination, privilege, and systemic inequality, encouraging constructive and respectful discussion.

Tips for Facilitators:

- Ensure the activity is conducted in a respectful and sensitive manner, recognizing that it may evoke strong emotions and personal reflections.
- Be prepared to support participants who may find the activity confronting or emotional, including having resources available for further support if needed.
- Emphasize the confidentiality and voluntary nature of the discussions, ensuring participants feel safe to share their thoughts and experiences.
- Facilitate the activity and discussion with an emphasis on learning and growth, avoiding blame or guilt which can be counterproductive.



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MIND Project Planning and Implementation

The "MIND Project Planning and Implementation" activity is an engaging and practical session designed to consolidate the learnings from previous workshops and discussions into actionable project plans. This activity empowers participants to apply their insights and ideas to real-world issues, focusing on intercultural challenges and opportunities. Here's a detailed overview of how the activity unfolds:

How It Works:

1. Group Formation and Topic Selection:

- Participants are divided into small groups based on mutual interests or assigned to ensure diversity within each group. This fosters a collaborative environment that benefits from a variety of perspectives.
- Each group selects or is assigned an intercultural issue or challenge they are passionate about addressing. This issue should be relevant to the themes explored during the #MIND project.

2. Problem Identification:

- Groups begin by clearly defining the problem they aim to tackle. This involves discussing the root causes, the affected populations, and the specific aspects of the issue they want to focus on.
- Facilitators guide this process, ensuring that each group's problem statement is clear, concise, and actionable.

3. Goal Setting:

- Once the problem is defined, groups set specific, measurable, achievable, relevant, and time-bound (SMART) goals for their project. These goals should outline what the project aims to achieve in addressing the chosen issue.
- Facilitators help groups ensure their goals are aligned with the scope of the problem and are realistically attainable.

4. Designing Activities:

- With goals in place, groups brainstorm and plan specific activities that will help achieve their objectives. These might include workshops, awareness campaigns, community events, or any other initiatives relevant to their project.
- Creativity and innovation are encouraged, with facilitators providing feedback and suggestions to enhance the effectiveness of proposed activities.

5. Budget Development:

- Groups develop a preliminary budget for their project, identifying potential costs associated with their planned activities. This may include materials, venue rentals, promotional efforts, and any other expenses.
- Facilitators introduce basic budgeting principles and offer guidance on creating a realistic and sustainable budget plan.

6. Presentation of Project Plans:

- At the end of the session, each group presents their project plan to the rest of the participants. This presentation includes the problem statement, goals, planned activities, and budget overview.
- Feedback is encouraged from both peers and facilitators, offering constructive suggestions for refinement and improvement.

Objectives and Benefits:

- **Application of Learning:** Allows participants to apply the knowledge and skills acquired during the #MIND project to real-world challenges, reinforcing their learning through practical application.

- **Project Management Skills:** Enhances participants' project planning and management skills, including problem-solving, goal setting, activity planning, and budgeting.
- **Empowerment and Agency:** Empowers participants to take initiative and become agents of change in addressing intercultural issues, fostering a sense of responsibility and capability.

Tips for Facilitators:

- Provide examples of successful projects or initiatives to inspire and guide participants in their planning process.
- Ensure that each group receives equal support and guidance from facilitators to develop their project plans effectively.
- Encourage a feedback-friendly environment during the presentations, where constructive criticism is welcomed and valued.

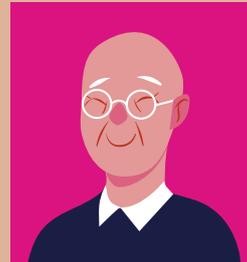
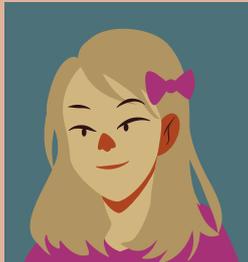
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
