INTRODUCTION TO

FEMINISM is both a movement and a set of ideologies advocating for the political, economic, social, and cultural equality of all genders, with a focus on addressing and dismantling systemic inequalities faced by women and marginalized genders.


- UN Women (2020): Feminism seeks to empower women and challenge patriarchal norms that limit opportunities and perpetuate inequality
- Bell Hooks (2000): Feminism is a movement to end sexism, sexist exploitation, and oppression [all individuals affected by gendered oppression, not just women]











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• Agency and Empowerment: Focuses on individuals' and groups' ability to challenge and reshape societal norms.

Core Principles Today

1. Gender Equality: equal rights, opportunities, and access to resources. Ex: closing gender pay gaps, equitable representation in leadership roles, and dismantling structural barriers.

2. Intersectionality:

discrimination based on the intersection of different identities, including race, class, sexuality, disability, and gender. Ex: women of color also LGBTQ+ individuals.

3. Reproductive Rights and Bodily Autonomy: the right to make decisions about their own body, including access to contraception, abortion, and healthcare.

4. Advocacy Against Gender-Based Violence: Ending violence and harassment against women and marginalized genders in all forms.

5. Social and Cultural
Transformation: Deconstructing
societal norms and stereotypes
that perpetuate sexism and
patriarchy in family, media,
education, and workplace
policies

6. Economic Justice: address pay disparities, unpaid labor, and access to economic opportunities



7. Emphasis on Agency and Empowerment: Empowering individuals to make their own choices and lead their lives authentically without societal restrictions.

8. Environmental Feminism:

Recognizing the intersection of environmental issues and gender

9. Continuous Reflection and Evolution: Feminism and feminist theory adapt to changing societal contexts and critiques to remain relevant.

Here are some cases. What can we do?

Example - Women of Color in the Workplace

A Black woman faces both racism and sexism in her workplace

Example: Muslim Women and Islamophobia

A Muslim woman wearing a hijab experiences religious discrimination in public spaces and sexism tied to assumptions about her agency or beliefs.

Example - Immigrant Women in Low-Wage Jobs

An immigrant woman working in domestic labor may face xenophobia, sexism, and economic exploitation.

She might be paid less than male or native-born workers and face harassment with little legal recourse.

Example: LGBTQ+ People and Housing Discrimination

A transgender woman of color faces discrimination when seeking housing. She experiences transphobia from landlords and racism within broader social contexts.

ADVOCACY STRATEGY

STEP 1: Group Formation (4 people/group) & Issue Selection (5 min.)

Each group selects a feminist issue [Examples: Gender pay gap.

Reproductive rights. Gender-based violence, Unpaid care and

domestic work, Women in leadership / politics etc.]

STEP 2: Campaign Design (30 min.)

STEP 3: Present the Campaign (5 min./group)

Present your campaign as pitching it to stakeholders.







DEFINE THE PROBLEM

- What is the issue?
- Why does it matter?
- Provide statistics or examples (research).

SET GOALS

 What changes do you want to achieve? (e.g., a policy change, increased awareness, community action).

TARGET AUDIENCE

 Who needs to hear your message (e.g., policymakers, community members)?

CRAFT THE MESSAGE

- Develop a clear and compelling advocacy message / slogan.
- include a story

PLAN AN ACTION

• Tangible advocacy activity (e.g., a social media campaign, a petition, a community workshop).

DEVELOP A CALL TO ACTION

• How will you engage your audience to support your cause?
