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1. FOREWORD

First year of the "Youth in Action programme" 2007-2013, and resumption of the EuroMed Youth III programme, this year 2007 showed a new impulse of the Euro-Mediterranean cooperation.

Our SALTO-YOUTH EuroMed Resource Centre set as objectives:

- to accompany the launching of the two programmes "Youth in Action" and "EuroMed Youth III",
- to promote the (re)connexion between the different National Agencies and EuroMed Youth Units,
- to enhance the quality of the trainings and to revitalize the EuroMed Multipliers network,
- to highlight the "visibility" and the "promotion and dissemination of project results" of the two programmes.

The support to the EuroMed programmes encourages the Euro-Mediterranean cooperation.

Trainings focusing on the European Neighbourhood Policy and the two programmes "Youth in Action" and "EuroMed Youth III", their convergences and their differences, done to the EuroMed Youth Units workers, the "Action 3" project officers of the "Youth in Action" programme and the TCP project officers, by our Resource Centre contributed to develop the cooperation between the National Agencies of the "Youth in Action" programme and the EuroMed Youth Units.

2. TRAININGS AND EVENTS

For this launching year of the "Youth in Action" programme, the Salto-Youth EuroMed RC created a "Handbook for Hosting National Agencies" in order to help the hosting National Agencies to organize and prepare with the Euromed spirit, events and trainings in their country.

Moreover, for the first time, each activity was coordinated by a Coordinator chosen after the call for trainers. All coordinators met before the beginning of all the activities in order to choose their team of trainers, and in the framework of steering projects as the new concepts and thematic, the reporter. In this way, we enhance our Educational Reports Collection.

Concerned about the requests from the National Agencies and the needs of the European Commission in the framework of the "Youth in Action" programme, Salto-Youth EuroMed concentrated its efforts on new concepts and thematic (in green below – page 4) and bigger events (in red below).

In the same way, Salto-Youth EuroMed continued to cooperate with several National Agencies of the "Youth in Action" programme and some Salto RCs for its training courses, seminars and events. It should be considered that the EuroMed Youth Units of the "EuroMed Youth III" programme were invited to cooperate/ participate in these activities/events.

Moreover, in order to improve more and more the quality of its activities, Salto-Youth EuroMed decided to commission an **evaluation of its activities for 2007**. This evaluation was based on the one done by the participants after the activity and compiled in a report. The reporter for this evaluation was chosen for his expertise and his knowledge of EuroMed.

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2.1. International Events

Let's Meet our Neighbours and the World 30 May – 3 June 2007, Injep/ Marly-le-Roi – France

Paths to International Cooperation in the field of youth



The idea of having a big kick-off seminar that would open possibilities for cooperation with the Neighbouring Countries and the World within Youth in Action Programme arose in the end of previous year. The summaries of previous Youth Programme and experiences that many organizations gained in projects first with Third Countries, then with Partner Countries and now with the Neighbouring Partner Countries clearly showed a big need to support and develop the cooperation that goes much beyond the borders of European Union.

Having a seminar, where representatives from all the regions: Programme Countries, EuroMed, South East Europe as well as Eastern Europe and

Caucasus, could meet, create contacts and value the importance of wide international youth cooperation was our *dream* and also a very concrete aim for the beginning of 2007. We: European Commission, SALTO Regional Resource Centres and French National Agency had a *clear vision* of organizing an event, where the political input will goes together with a very actual work on future Youth Exchanges, Trainings, Seminars and European Voluntary Service projects.

Aims and objectives

Supported by the European Commission's General Directorate for Education and Culture and coorganized by the French National Agency and the three regional SALTO Resource Centres (EuroMed, EECA & SEE), this large event had been the occasion for 130 youth workers to explore ways of cooperation with Partner Countries within the new Youth in Action Programme. The main aim of this event was to introduce/explore the Cooperation with Neighbouring Countries of the European Union and other Partner Countries of the World within the new "Youth in Action Programme".

Specific objectives of this Seminar were

- To introduce the political framework of the European Neighbouring Policy.
- To introduce the Youth in Action program, its new features and explore the possibilities of cooperation with neighbouring countries (and the world).
- To present the actors and the support structures and to provide work instruments.
- To explore the richness of the neighbours (regions, youth work realities, good practices in program, and neighbour partner countries.
- To provide a space for partner matching and project development.

Profile of Participants and Selection

In the Seminar took part actors/multipliers from Programme Countries as well as from Neighbouring Partner Countries experienced in youth work and interested in developing cooperation projects together.

Staff of *National Agencies of Youth in Action Programme*, alongside with the representatives of **EuroMed Youth Units** has been also taken part in the Seminar.

Information on the Seminar was distributed by the Programme countries' *National Agencies* (coordinated by the *French National Agency*, which hosted the Seminar together with **SALTO EuroMed**) and the *Regional SALTOs* to their respective information networks. The applications from

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each region were gathered in appropriate SALTO Resource Centres and the selection was made by them

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EU Neighbourhood policy and Migrations: The role of the "Youth in Action" and "Euromed Youth III" programmes 27 November - 2 December 2007, Canary Islands - Spain



Conference organised with the Spanish National Agency for the "Youth in Action" programme, the Ministry of Work and Social Affairs in Madrid and the local government of Canaries Islands, on Tenerife Island.

Short Introduction

When we hear the word "neighbourhood", we immediately think about good relationship and this nice person that always have a cup of coffee or tea to offer, when we go asking for some sugar or wheat. When we hear about policies, our mind picture changes considerably...

Background

During the Middle-Age, the Mediterranean Sea was a common space for civilisations and communities, sharing trade and cultures, beliefs and values, where kingdoms and states - going one step beyond the political or economic interests - experienced the richness of diversity and intercultural awareness...

The EU main concern has been the active role of their members in the recovering of the Mediterranean Area as a space for peace and cooperation. Today Canary Islands is one of the places where illegal migration is more acute and for this reason the venue will offer a good starting point for debating on this thorny issue.

Conference main goals were:

- To acknowledge the main achievements occurred since the EU creation, its active role through its Euromed policies and the new challenges EU has to face;
- To promote an active, efficient and authentic neighbourhood policy in terms of migrations, involving and committing young people in this process;
- To use the new programmes (YIA and Euromed Youth III) to face the current challenges wihtin the Neighbourdhood Policy;
- To share tools, methods and strategies related with good practices which emerged in the previous EU funding period;

Profile of participants

The course was intended to be an opportunity for further training for youth workers and youth leaders who:

- were experienced in the Youth field, familiar with these topics and working with migrants;
- were open to enrich their knowledge and awareness regarding the other cultures;
- were committed to prepare themselves for the handled subjects, previous to their arrival and to do the remote work requested by the team in case of selection;
- were interested to develop projects within the Youth in Action and Euromed Youth Programmes;
- were supported by their organisation and have green light for implementing YOUTH projects:
- were able to communicate and work in at least one of the two working languages of this event (English and French);
- were residents in a European Union Member State and/or one of the EU Partner countries.

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What happened during the Conference?

The Conference gathered more than 100 people from 40 European and partner countries.

Youngsters, youth organizations, youth workers, 6 National Agencies of the "Youth in Action" programme, 6 EuroMed Units of the "EuroMed Youth III" programme, university experts, the Commission and institutional representatives from European Union, Balkans, Eastern Europe and Caucasus, debated on the role played by the two programmes "Youth in Action" and "EuroMed Youth III" in the framework of the European Neighbourhood Policy.

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TOOL FAIR 2nd edition 12-16 December 2007, Antalya - Turkey

Valorisation can be defined as the process of disseminating and exploiting the results of projects with a view to optimising their value, strengthening their impact and making the largest possible number of young people in Europe benefit from it. (DG-EAC)

Background

In order to have an impact (at local, regional, national, and in some cases also at European level), the results of all Youth in Action projects need to produce long-lasting effects and to be better known and actively used.

As far as project promoters are concerned, they should carry out activities aimed at making their projects and the results more visible, better known and sustainable. This means that the results of a project will continue to be used and have a positive effect on the largest possible number of young people once the project has come to an end.

... small projects may aim more towards having an impact at local level by carrying out visibility activities and by raising



awareness of the participants. On the contrary, larger projects, based on bigger partnerships, may be more ambitious and aim at creating an impact at sectoral or national and European level through a strategy for the dissemination, exploitation and follow-up of their results. "Youth in Action Programme guide"

Following the frank success of this large event (France, December 2006) the Salto Youth EuroMed RC re-co-organised the **second edition of the "Tool Fair"**.

Once again 100 people were expected!! Participants come from both "Programme" and "Partner" countries, all stakeholders of the YOUTH programme: young people, youth workers, trainers, etc.

In one place, for 5 days, the Fair was a "showroom" for the huge variety and richness of tools developed and used under the YOUTH programme, a place to experiment with methods and exercises used within the different actions (youth exchanges, EVS, youth initiatives, training) and based on different themes (cultural diversity, inclusion, cooperation with partner countries, etc...).

The Fair could become the creation of the participants themselves and enable their tools to be used throughout the programme. "Savoir-faire" will be gathered in order to create a "common memory".

Aim/Objectives

- To gather and to "valorise" tools created and implemented within the framework of youth work in general and Youth in Action programme more specifically
- To test tools,
- To analyse and to reflect on the transferability of these tools.

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Profile of the participants:

Participants should:

- be active in the youth field in general and more specifically within the YOUTH in Action Programme (young people, youth workers, youth leaders, trainers, NA representatives,...)
- have created a "tool" and experienced it within a YOUTH project;
- be ready to share it with others during the fair

What is meant by "tool"?

A tool is any educational means, process or materials which can be used to support trainers, youth workers or young people themselves to better achieve the aims or goals of their activities. It can be "touchable", "showable", like a video, a booklet, a report, a board game, etc. It can be experienced, like a simulation game, a creative workshop, a quiz, a role play or any outdoor activities, etc.

What happened during the Tool Fair?

29 Workshops running during 3 days:

- 21 different tools presented in workshops
- 3 workshops on technical tools
- 5 workshops on Tools for cooperation
- Around 40 tools presented in the exhibition
- 3 lectures from experts
- Around 50 project ideas discussed in the partnership building activity
- Discover of Turkish culture, and MORE!

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2.2. International Training Courses

Place and role of Minorities in EuroMed context: Ethnic, Linguistic and Religious 22-30 September 2007, Basque country - Spain



One of the richness of the Euro Mediterranean area is the coexistence of a high percentage of minorities full of aspects that make them unique. Due to different social, cultural and political factors, some minorities are being extinct while some others survive.

Background

Within this framework, the Salto-Youth EuroMed Resource Centre with the support of the Basque Government and the collaboration of the Spanish NA for the "Youth in Action" Programme were willing to develop for the first time this training course about the place and role of minorities in the Euromed context.

Specificity of the venue

Prehistoric man came to the Western foothills of the Pyrenees in search of a place to settle and live. Close to the natural border formed by the mountains that stretch across the land joining the Iberian Peninsula to the rest of Europe - he found what he was looking for. The Basques have lived uninterruptedly in this small region since the beginning of recorded time by maintaining their age-old cultural traditions, and keeping their historic identity alive, the Basques provide a link with man's distant past. Euskara, the Basque language, is probably the oldest surviving language in



Europe. As the Basques, several other minorities in Europe and in Meda countries have lived uninterruptedly in small areas and kept alive culture, traditions and more generally their identity throughout the centuries.

Aim

In order to know more about the reality of minorities in the Euromed frame this training course aimed at:

- Increasing participants' knowledge about the situation of minorities in the Euromed context: history, law, existing and persecuted minorities...;
- facilitating the sharing of experiences and realities about minorities in the countries involved;
- offering a special focus on ethnic, linguistic and religious minorities, having as a starting point the reality of the hosting region;
- providing participants with a better knowledge about the new Youth in Action programme and the Euromed Youth Programme III;
- Acquiring competences and learning new methods that will help participants to develop projects in the Euromed frame focus on the topic of minorities.

Profile of participants

The course was intended to be an opportunity for further training for youth workers and youth leaders who:

- were experienced in the Youth field and familiar with these topics and ideally working with minorities:
- were open to enrich their knowledge and awareness regarding the other cultures;
- were committed to prepare themselves for the above-mentioned subjects, previous to their arrival and to do the remote work requested by the team in case of selection;
- were motivated to undergo training and able to attend the course for its full duration;

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- were supported by their organisation and have green light for implementing a Euro-Med YOUTH project;
- were able to communicate and work in at least one of the two working languages of this training course (English and French)
- were residents in a European Union Member States or in a Mediterranean Partner countries signatory to the Barcelona Declaration.

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Inter-religious Dialogue: Mediterranean, Caucasian and European contexts 6-14 October 2007, Istanbul - Turkey



Background

Inter-religious Dialogue, for a better Understanding!

In a globalize world where intra- and inter-religious conflicts remain unabated, it may be necessary to grant greater attention to Dialogue. Intercultural and inter-religious dialogues are then seen as ever more essential tools for human development and peace building. Learning the art of dialogue is both a personal and social process. Developing one's skills and capacity for dialogue implies a willingness to be open while retaining one's critical judgment. Dialogue concerns us all: from

decision-makers, trainers, youth leaders to individuals within each community.

Specificity of the venue

The city of Istanbul has many areas where people of very different religions have lived side-by-side for centuries with their practices and customs and continue to do. One can find Catholic, Orthodox, Protestant, Armenian Churches, Synagogues as well as Mosques where to practice the religion of his/her choosing.

This seminar stood during the Ramadan and the Aid feast and we found this aspect particularly interesting to treat the subject of interreligious dialogue.



Aim

The main aim of this training seminar was to prepare youth workers to deal with religious issues in their job and to promote dialogue among the different religions, spiritual and humanistic traditions mainly in the Mediterranean, Caucasian and European contexts where conflicts are increasingly associated with religious belonging (as today there are concerns about toleration of other religious groups in Islamic states and manifestations of Islamophobia and anti-Semitism against European Muslims and Jews).

It stressed the reciprocal interactions and influences between, on the one hand, religions, spiritual and humanistic traditions, and on the other, the need to promote understanding between them in order to challenge ignorance and prejudices and foster mutual respect.

Objectives

On a more theoretical basis, this training seminar considered and analysed - on a "get-to-know" way - the major religions (distinguished from minor religions regarding the number of adherents) belonging to the Mediterranean, Caucasian and European contexts and gave a coherent explanation of the historical development of religious ideas, institutions, and practices.

These are: Christianity, Islam (which are together with Hinduism and Buddhism the largest world religions today representing approximately 75% of humanity) Judaism (which counts 14 million followers around the world) as well as other "irreligious" or secular approaches as Humanism, Atheism, Rationalism, Agnosticism and other movements (approximately 1 billion people adherents).

Thus, the training seminar tackled some key concepts as the meaning of religion, freedom of belief and freedom of worship, the individual choice not to follow any religion and not to believe in any god but also freedom of religion, religious toleration, separation of church and state or secularism (laïcité) and other notion necessary for a broad understanding of the major religious traditions that have influenced the development of the EuroMed space (Judaism, Christianity, and Islam) as well as the ways in which church and state have related through history.

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A special focus had been given to the reciprocal interactions and influences between, on the one hand, religions, spiritual and humanistic traditions, and on the other, the need to promote understanding between them in order to challenge ignorance and prejudices and to foster mutual respect, considering that the promotion of religious toleration and inter-religious dialogue remain "of primordial importance," for the *Youth in Action* and *EuroMed Youth* programmes.

The following **concrete objectives** had been set in order to reach the aims as described above:

- 1) To provide educational support and time for the participants to share and reflect about their own experiences and knowledge in the field of inter-religious dialogue
- 2) To disseminate the principles of inter-religious dialogue using different means.
- 3) To identify common elements in relation with the other religions that help participants built common understanding
- 4) To help and support participants in improving their competence (Knowledge, Skills, Attitudes and Values) in the field of inter-religious dialogue.
- 5) To allocate space for the participants to develop project ideas in the field of inter-religious dialogue in the Mediterranean, Caucasian and European areas.
- 6) To develop specific methods and necessary tools for better cooperation in the future.

Profile of participants

The course was intended to be an opportunity for further training for youth workers and youth leaders who:

- were experienced in the Youth field and familiar with this topic;
- were open to enrich their knowledge and awareness regarding the other cultures;
- were committed to prepare themselves for the above-mentioned subjects, previous to their arrival and to do the remote work requested by the team in case of selection;
- were motivated to undergo training and able to attend the course for its full duration;
- were supported by their organization and have green light for implementing the Youth in Action and Euromed Youth projects;
- were able to communicate in English language this is only one working language; (language support from the team will be available to certain level French, Russian, Arabic, German, Polish and Azeri)
- were residents in a European Union Member State, or in a Mediterranean Partner country signatory to the Barcelona Process, or in one of the seven countries belonging to Eastern Europe and Caucasus partner region.

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Let's meet the three cultures 27 October - 4 November 2007, Paris - France

This is the 4th and the last edition of this thematic training course.

The event was co-organised with the French National Agency of the "Youth in Action" programme.

Background

The three cultures, Christianity, Islam and Judaism, have been present in Europe since early times. Europe today reflect the rich and intrinsic relations between the cultures along the times, showing in itself meeting points as well as the result of conflicts along the years.



Paris, standing in the geographical and cultural middle of the continent, represents at the same time those cultures, within a society which strives for a constant secularism.

Specificity of the venue

The symbol of the city of Paris, with its rich multicultural history and its communities, was used as an educational tool. More than ever before, Paris of the 21st century is a feisty brew of people from around the world. Old-fashioned French flavours have not been lost, or even submerged men with "berets" still play "boules" on the "quais de Seine", and "Mesdames" still feed tasty titbits to their poodles from the restaurant table. But there are more ingredients in the city mix, more viewpoints. It is estimated that 20% of the two million people living in central Paris are



immigrants. In the North African strongholds of "Belleville" and "La Goutte d'Or", men in bars sup sugary mint tea and puff on water pipes. Restaurants serve couscous, tagine and sticky pastries against a background of raï music.

Aim

To develop Euro-Mediterranean cooperation, reinforcing the quality of the Euromed Youth Programme within an intercultural context, increasing the participants' skills in Euromed cultures (not cultural management) and their active participation in the Euro Mediterranean process.

Objectives

- To know Euromed cultures and their relation with the Christianity, Islam and Judaism.
- To reflect on the participants' own cultural identity.
- To identify the common elements in relation with the other cultures.
- To reflect on the place of secularism in Euromed societies.
- To be able to create together using the past to prepare a better future.
- To prepare the framework and coach the participants in the realisation of concrete partnerships within the Euromed Youth Programme.

Main features

Intercultural activities were organized using different techniques and methods linked to communication tools like: languages, arts forms, food, traditions, (advertising), as well as using the five senses.

Activities were organized using different techniques and methods linked to verbal and non-verbal communication.

Each group worked in its own topic, in relations to the three cultures and the place of secularism.

Each group had to research, develop and deliver a two-hour non-formal education activity to the rest of the group, which has a transferable characteristic to be later implemented practically with youth within the Euromed region.

Participants had to research about the topic, how it was in the past; and they had to prepare and to organise one active performance to provide these discoveries to other participants;

Each topic needed to be crossed by two themes: the place of the women and the religion, in each of these four topics in the past, in order to be used during a debriefing and to reflect on today's reality.

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Additional programme elements

- Why EuroMed (cooperation) projects?
- Communication and group dynamics.
- Christianity, Islam and Judaism within EuroMed.
- The place of secularism in EuroMed societies and its relation with the three cultures.
- Definitions of culture, multiculturalism and interculturalism.
- Intercultural awareness.
- International teamwork.
- Evaluation.
- Planning of follow-up.

Profile of participants

The course was intended to be an opportunity for further training for youth workers and youth leaders who:

- were experienced in the Youth field and familiar with this topic;
- were open to enrich their knowledge and awareness regarding the other cultures;
- were committed to prepare themselves for the above-mentioned subjects, previous to their arrival and to do the remote work requested by the team in case of selection;
- were motivated to undergo training and able to attend the course for its full duration;
- were supported by their organisation and have green light for implementing a Euro-Med YOUTH project;
- were able to communicate and work in at least one of the two working languages of this training course (English and French)

This 4th edition marked the end of the compilation of educational units related to this topic (exercises, stimulation games...). An Educational report will be published in 2008 on "the Three Cultures".









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2.3. Contact Making Seminar

EVS Odyssey in EuroMed 5- 9 September 2007, Høje Taastrup - Denmark



This CMS, organised together with the Swedish National Agency, Ungdomsstyrelsen, the Finnish National Agency, CIMO, and the Danish National Agency, CIRIUS, aimed to boost the "Action 2" cooperation among these three countries' and the Mediterranean partners countries' youth organisations dealing with EVS!

Let's get prepared to enter into the new "Youth in Action" and Euromed Youth III" programmes with new quality of EVS projects!

Background

Euromed cooperation has been developing and enriching constantly since its beginning. EU and Meda countries have been bridging both sides of the Mediterranean Sea, youth organizations have been contributing to create links and to make out of this cooperation between countries a reality of youth projects.

The new generation of programmes "Youth in Action" and "Euromed Youth III" will offer to young people the opportunity of enriching their own individual educational pathway by Euromed Voluntary Service and to youth organizations the chance to turn these individual wills into an exciting local hosting project, which could give them the opportunity to develop new projects, new ways of working.

Euromed Voluntary Service

This is the meaning of European Voluntary Service in Euromed: create links, between individual projects of young people, and strategies of Euromed cooperation between youth organisations from Nordic countries and countries from the Southern bank of the Mediterranean Sea.

A Long Term Training-Course on Networking Projects focusing on EVS 3 steps: 2007 Greece / 2008 Cyprus



Why is it an issue?

"...The anxiety and confusion caused by the "clash of civilizations" theory regrettably has distorted the terms of the discourse on the real nature of the predicament the world is facing. The history of relations between cultures is not only one of wars and confrontation. It is also based on centuries of constructive exchanges, cross-fertilization, and peaceful coexistence. Moreover, classifying internally fluid and diverse societies along hard-and-fast lines of civilizations interferes with more illuminating

ways of understanding questions of identity, motivation and behavior..."1

This issue is now political, challenging and up-to-date. The European Union, through the "Youth in Action" and the "Euromed Youth III" Programmes, is fully part of this reflection process. Naturally, Salto-Youth EuroMed, as a resource centre for training and cooperation within the Euromed Youth Programme, has an important role to play: after having worked on training courses like "Education and civilization" or "Common memory, common heritage", Salto-Youth EuroMed RC, the Greek and Cypriot National Agencies decided to co-organize and to respectively host the two training events of this long term process. The question of civilizations and dialogue can surely gain historical, philosophical and geopolitical consistence at the crossroad between these two countries.

Within Euromed area the question of dialogue as an operational tool, for developing networking and partnership strategy of non formal education between the two sides of the Mediterranean Sea is a crucial and challenging issue. In other words, to make dialogue among civilisations become a reality.

What do we propose?

A long-term Training Course, thematic, but also strongly oriented towards action and strategy of

cooperation, through the Action 4.3, sub-action "Networking projects".

3 main phases:

- 1st step: Training-Course "Common roots for a common ground"
- **2nd step**: Practical experience of networking projects "Networks for dialogue". Deadline of 1st of February.
- 3rd step: Training-Course and ongoing evaluation of networking projects "Common ground for a common future"

3. POOL OF TRAINERS

In 2007, after a call for candidates, the Salto Euromed resource center recruited 7 coordinators, 7 facilitators and 10 trainers. Some of the trainers were contracted as "junior trainer". Most of them participated as trainees in one of our activities. This way of doing offer them the opportunity to develop their skills and to become a trainer and to enlarge the number of potential trainers. The majority of the selected people were trained in TATEM and TOTEM long term training courses.

Definition of <u>COORDINATOR</u>, <u>TRAINER</u>, <u>FACILITATOR</u> (from the Handbook for the organization of SALTO-YOUTH EuroMed Activities – Edition 2008)

COORDINATOR

The coordinator of the EuroMed Activity is an experienced trainer selected and appointed by the SALTO-YOUTH EuroMed RC. In all points of view, he/she is the referent on behalf of Bernard Abrignani, Coordinator of the SALTO-YOUTH EuroMed Resource Centre.

Appointed by the SALTO-YOUTH EuroMed Resource Centre, the coordinator has to develop and prepare remotely the program of the Activity and ensure an equitable division of tasks between team members. The coordinator will ensure a regular and transparent communication process between team members.

The coordinator needs to share with the team members the responsibility for the preparatory remote work requested from the participants and for any educational communication with participants before the start of the Activity. SALTO-YOUTH EuroMed Resource Centre will make information it has about participants available to the team right after the selection of the candidates is closed.

After the Activity, the coordinator has to ensure his/her own participation to its evaluation and follow-up process.

The coordinator obligations are:

- to analyse and synthesise participants' evaluation forms
- to evaluate his/her own contribution
- to contribute to the final report (methodology and exercises)
- to fill in all new activities developed in the toolbox on http://www.SALTO-YOUTH.net/toolbox
- to write afterwards a five pages maximum personal report/analyse/evaluation on the Activity.

TRAINER

Under the impulse of the coordinator of the Activity, appointed by the SALTO-YOUTH EuroMed Resource Centre, the trainer has to develop and prepare remotely the program in close cooperation with the team members. The trainer will be available for all requests which come from the coordinator.

The trainer has to share with the team members the responsibility for the preparatory remote work requested from the participants and for any educational communication with participants before the start of the Activity. The trainer has to run working sessions during the activity and to be as much pedagogical as possible. He will give inputs as the same level than the coordinator.

After the Activity, the trainer has to ensure his/her own participation to its evaluation and follow-up process.

FACILITATOR

The specific tasks of the facilitator are:

- to facilitate the progress of the program
- to ease the communication between the participants.
- to contribute to the general atmosphere of the event by creating a smooth way of interpersonal relations

After the Activity, the facilitator has to ensure his/her own participation to its evaluation and follow-up process.



5. GOOD EDUCATIONAL PRACTICES

The Salto-Youth EuroMed RC has two sectors of intervention, the better known being the Euromed area and the lesser one the field of the good teaching practices.

For this reason, we collect teaching aids related on the "Youth in Action" programme in particular and non formal education in general; their distribution through a Newsletter (no issue this year) and by the management of the "Tool box" on the Salto RCs' website http://www.salto-youth.net/toolbox/.

5.1. TOOL BOX

(report realized by Clément Dupuis)

Presentation of the toolbox

The Toolbox for Training is like an on-line bookshelf, from which people working on the youth-field (especially trainers) can pull different training tools according to their needs. This facilitates access to available training material and avoids reinventing the wheel. The search function allows people to look for individual training methods, reference texts or manuals or presentations, without needing to know in which course report they were used. They simply need to type a keyword or select which type of tool they are looking for about which topic.

Moreover, it is possible to add training methods or background texts to this increasing collection of training material (by creating a username and login). Moreover, people can add trainer comments at the bottom of each listed training tool (e.g. if they have used one of the training tools in a different way etc) to increase the body of knowledge dynamically. To ensure quality and coherence, your additions will be checked by the administrator before going online.

The training tools in this Toolbox for Training have been pooled from various sources. SALTO does not claim it being its property. Most of these training methods have been around for many years and have been used in numerous courses in a large variety of formats. Therefore it is difficult to refer to the original source of the tool. Should people know the original or whether copyright is pending on a tool, they can inform toolbox@salto-youth.net and the team will adapt the tool accordingly.

In total, 715 tools have been entered since the creation of the toolbox, with 667 available online after the check of the administrator.



Evolution of the tool box

Since 2003, the number of tools available never stopped increasing. The addition of new tools varies a lot year to year.




The proportion of tools that were not validated remains very little (48 out of 715 in total). The reasons why a few of them:

- don't have a clear and precise description of the tool
- are a commercial promotion of a product
- are already put in the toolbox (even with another name)
- remain bad quality tools that are poor or tools that reach results that are at the opposite of the objectives of the YOUTH in ACTION programme.




More and more people tend to get on the tool box page of the SALTO-YOUTH webpage. Within 4 years, we can observe a growth of 417,42 %.

To finish with, the proportion of visits of the toolbox in the SALTO-YOUTH website increased from 1,99% in 2003 to 4,29% in 2007.



Development opportunities of the toolbox

First, except figures, it remains hard to draw clear analyses and conclusions on the toolbox. Therefore, it would be interesting to carry a study, asking the following question to the users of the toolbox:

How do they get information on the toolbox?

Have they got specific expectations? (in term of content and types of tools available)...

Second, one could ask the users to note the quality of the tools available (e.g. stars). The quality of the tool (referring on the notes given) could be a good opportunity to range the tools available.

5.2. TOOL FAIR



The Tools collected through the Tool Box can be shown during the Tool Fair: the unique event which gives the opportunity to the partners, the youth trainers and the youth organizations to present their tools, to exchange their educational good practices and to think about the best means to hand them down.

6.2. Partnerships

- As a member of the of the follow-up group on Euromed, Human Rights and Intercultural Dialogue, Salto-Youth EuroMed continues its strong partnership with the partners involved in this committee: DG EAC and AIDCO of the European Commission, the Council of Europe, the EuroMed Platform, the Anna Lindh Foundation, the European Youth Forum and a selection of researchers and experts. This group meets twice a year.
- Salto-Youth EuroMed is still an active member of the Editorial Committee of the "Coyote Magazine" for Trainers.
- TCP Meeting: as the other Resource Centres, Salto-Youth EuroMed participates each year
 in the Training and Cooperation Plan Meeting in Bonn, to meet the National Agencies and
 to prepare the Workplan for the next year according to the specific needs of NAs.
- SALTO Meeting: each year all the Salto RCs meet in order to discuss on calendars, common activities and procedures, visibility of the programme. This year, Salto-Youth EuroMed was in charge of preparing the content of the agenda and the co-organization with Salto-Youth Eastern Europe and Caucasus.

In 2007, the Salto-Youth EuroMed showed its involvement in a common work with the other Salto RCs through:

- the common Brochure "Paths to the International field of youth", with regional Salto RCs (EECA and SEE),
- the common event "Let's meet our Neighbours and the World", with regional Salto RCs (EECA and SEE),
- the educational report "Faith, Religion and Dialogue (publication in January 2008) following up the idea to join the two activities "Faith and Dialogue" done by Salto Cultural Diversity and "Inter-religious Dialogue" done by Salto EuroMed and Salto EECA.

In 2008, Salto-Youth EuroMed will continue its strong cooperation with the other Saltto RCs through common actions and activities.

7. ACTIVITIES 2007 IN NUMBERS

In 2007, Salto-Youth EuroMed carried out most of its activities, only the training course "Democracy in EuroMed context: illusion or reality?" had been postponed to 2008 because the Italian NA received its own contract too late.

Year after year, the number of application forms increases and for 2007, Salto-Youth EuroMed received **2.227 application forms** and **400 trainees** on the whole of our activities.


This rise is particularly remarkable because the 1st step of the long term training course "Dialogue among civilizations" was, first, postponed to 2008, and it was only 2 months before the beginning of the training that we get the dates for the end of the year 2007.


Applications 2006/2007





Applications 2007




In 2006, the ratio between received application forms and participants was around 27%. This year, in spite of all the efforts done by NAs, EMYUs and Salto-Youth EuroMed, the ratio decreased to 18%. However, this represents **400 participants, i.e 108 more than in 2006**!




This graph shows the cooperation which is building between UE programme countries and neighbourhood countries...first evaluation of "Paths to the International Cooperation – Youth in Action"



Geographical Distribution of Meda participants




Geographical Distribution of EU participants







8. CONCLUSION

The year 2007 showed 3 main axes:

- The launching of the two new programmes « Youth in Action and « EuroMed Youth III »
- The awakening of the EuroMed Youth Units and the (re)connexion between National Agencies and the EuroMed Youth Units
- The necessity of improving the visibility of the "Youth in Action" programme and the "Dissemination and exploitation of result projects" granted through the realization of communication strategies.

For Salto-Youth EuroMed, the outcome of the year 2007 is guite positive:

- we produced new concepts, approached sensitive thematic and realized big events,
- we focused our strategy thematic on European Neighborhood Policy and EVS networking as requested by the NAs and the Commission,
- we realized the whole of our activities (except for one training course postponed to 2008),
- the number of application forms and participants increases year after year,
- and for the first time, we produce an objective analysis of our trainings through the Evaluation 2007.

Moreover, we noticed that following the example of the European countries, Baltic and Northern countries showed a keen interest in the Mediterranean area.

Salto-Youth EuroMed continues the « Dissemination and Exploitation of result projects » through its publications, reports and magazine and the management of the Tool box. In 2007, we organized the 2nd edition of the Tool fair which is the unique event where youth workers and youth leaders can share their tools, skills and competences. The 3rd edition is already planned in Spain in 2008.

Lastly, Salto-Youth EuroMed shows a specific commitment to develop the Salto-Youth Resource centres as a strong and active network which supports the National Agencies for the "Youth in Action" programme. This year was illustrated with our close partnership with the regional Salto RCs. Furthermore, we work to improve and foster the cooperation and internal synergies between all 8 Resource Centres.
