Dear colleague,

We are happy to announce the international seminar aimed at exploring the diversity of educational practices supporting the quality in youth field¹ - from formal to non-formal education settings in their various levels.

We offer a platform for different stakeholders to meet and discover the role and contributions of these practices to the development of quality in youth field. Also to share the most exciting practices as well as to discuss the ideas for future actions needed for further developments.

Hence the seminar seeks to answer:

What, how, why, when and where is provided to educate the actors of youth field - in formal and non-formal environments - to contribute to the quality of youth field?

OBJECTIVES:

- to frame and explore the key challenges of the youth field, from grassroots to European levels;
- to explore the role and potential of educating and training youth field actors in support of quality and capacity building in the youth field;
- to share realities and practices in different countries, taking into account the specifics and potentials of formal and non-formal settings in education and training;
- to provide opportunities for mutual learning and developing ideas for future co-operation across contexts and levels;
- to look for ways to support personal and professional development of people involved in education and training in youth field with support from European programmes and beyond.

Estonia is happy to host the seminar that links with the achievements of the national program "Developing youth work quality" that has been implemented in the years 2008-2013 in the frame of European Social Fund. The seminar also links to the priorities of European Training Strategy that contibutes to the development of youth field in Europe and has relevance to the new EU programme for 2014-2020.

 ¹ Youth work is a broad term covering a large scope of activities of a social, cultural, educational or political nature both by, with and for young people. Increasingly, such activities also include sport and services for young people. Youth work takes place in the extra curricular area, as well as through specific leisure time activities, and is based on nonformal and informal learning processes and on voluntary participation (Resolution on youth work. Council of European Union, 2010). In the context of this seminar, youth field is used as a complex term, encompassing both the youth work as well as the policy dimension related to youth (issues).

PARTICIPANTS:

The seminar welcomes up to 65 people who are connected to education and training for youth field actors in Europe: trainers, teachers and lecturers, curricula responsibles, organisers of training, institutions and umbrella organisations from the fields of education and training, policy makers and researchers, National Agency representatives dealing with training etc.

The diversity of the group of participants in terms of their backgrounds and educational approaches is one of the intrinsic values of the seminar. We would especially like to welcome participants who:

- are ready to share some innovative educational practices supporting the quality of youth field;
- have launched educational projects and/or introduced systematic approaches towards youth field actor's training through co-operation between formal education and non-formal training;
- are interested in expanding their international networks in the field of education and training.

PROGRAMME:

The programme of the seminar will start in the afternoon 14th of October and departures are planned from the morning of 17th of October. The programme will include thematic inputs, debates and discussions, workshops for sharing inspiring practices and cultural programme. Working language of the seminar is English.

Participants are encouraged to introduce their **educational practices supporting the quality in youth field**, incl. materials, manuals, tools, examples of academic curricula, quality and competence frameworks, research projects around education and training, cooperation projects between academic and youth field, further training programmes, policy frameworks, initiatives to support the internationalisation of youth field etc. Please see the application form for making your proposal for possible contribution in this respect.

Design of the programme high-lights the following key themes:

- Challenges of working in the youth field and how to address these in relation to the quality in youth field;
- Current practices in educating and training youth field actors in support of quality and capacity building what can we learn from these?
- Building the future: what is emerging today and what is needed?

Her calling is to support leaders in hosting meaningful change processes through simple practices like circle or open space and is happy to have had the chance to learn from some of the most outstanding practitioners in the field of participative leadership like Peter Senge, Otto Scharmer and Juanita Brown.

In addition to Piret and Andreas, several experts from the European youth field as well as formal and non-formal settings of education and training will contribute to the programme.

ORGANISERS AND PARTNERS:

Seminar is organised by Foundation Archimedes, Estonian National Agency in the frame of the European Social Fund programme "Developing youth work quality" with support from the European Union Youth in Action programme National Agencies' network.

Seminar is planned and implemented with the support from the Steering Group, involving the Youth In Action National Agencies in United Kingdom and Slovakia and in consultation with representatives of academic institutions holding youth work curricula in Estonia: Narva College of University of Tartu, Viljandi Cultural Academy of University of Tartu and Pedagogical College of Tallinn University.

Youthpolicy.org - a global community and knowledge base on youth policy - will contribute to the success of the seminar as partner responsible for dissemination and exploitation of its results to wider public.
