








Are you asking yourself...

The Art of Hosting is a training course to learn about and stimulate innovative youth leadership, through building competencies to host meaningful and strategic conversations



Through our work we have experienced that meaningful and strategic conversations are an opportunity to inspire passion and responsibility, bring out the greatness in people and create the futures we are longing for.

Hosting and convening such conversations is a leadership practice, where leaders do not give us answers, but help us discover answers together.

We offer...

- Skills-building in hosting different conversation methods, such as: Circle Practice, Open Space Technology, World Café and Appreciative Inquiry
- Development of cross-cutting competencies related to hosting, such as: asking powerful questions, inviting diversity, working with divergence and convergence, and walking the path of change and transformation, in a dance of chaos and order (Chaordic)
- Reflection on youth leadership practices and increasing self-awareness and self-confidence through an integral and playful approach to leadership
- The space and support to reflect on your specific youthrelated project, initiative or organisation; how it can be enhanced through applying your learning from the course and how to overcome possible "back-home" resistance to change














This training is not for spectators!


Who are your Hosts?

The training will take place at: Castle Borl, Ptuj, Slovenia.

It is easily accessible by train or air (via Graz or Ljubljana).

Budget airlines are available to both these cities. Upon registration, we are happy to provide you with more detailed information if required.

The course will takes place July 6-9, 2006. We ask you to arrive the evening of July 5th and depart the morning of July 10th. Only full participation is accepted.

The cost of the course is 650EUR. This includes meals, accommodation and materials for the course duration. We don't want cost to be an obstacle to youth participation and diversity; scholarships will be made available pending available funding. We practice the principle of "Contribute what you can - plus a little bit more" so let us know as soon as possible what makes it possible for you to come. Through the registration form please inform us what is possible for you to afford.

There is no greater power than a community discovering what it cares about



Ask "What's possible?" not "What's wrong?" Keep asking.

Notice what you care about. Assume that many others share your dreams.

Be brave enough to start a conversation that matters.

Talk to people you know.

Talk to people you don't know.

Talk to people you never talk to.

Be intrigued by the differences you hear. Expect to be surprised. Treasure curiosity more than certainty.
